Its name is Kanaola and it is bounded on the north by Kamaoha, on the east by Palipali, on the south by Kakaauki, on the west by Honokane. My right to the land was from Kamehameha III to Namauu and from Namauu to Kamehaiku, and to me. Kaena is another claim. It is bounded on the north by Kaakauhi, on the east by Kuawini, on the south by Waihilau, on the west by Honokane.

Greetings to the Land Commissioners: I hereby explain my land claim. I am Kaholoaa. I have an 'ili, named Ki, and I also have a house lot. East 22, west, 22, north 33, south 33, that is my claim. I also have 9 mala of vegetable food, 1 mala of mamaki, and 2 mala of bananas

Greetings to the Land Commissioners: I hereby state my claim on the Island of Hawaii, a parcel of land at Hamakua in
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the 'ili of Kamakahonua; it is enclosed by a stone wall. My right of occupancy is from 1837 at this place, and it is occupied at this time when Kamehameha III reigns.
